Where Arizonans Across Party Lines Consistently A

Strong public consensus:

- ✓ Every child deserves a high-quality education
- ✓ Close achievement gaps among student groups
- ✓Increase enrollment and completion in postsecondary education
- ✓ Increase funding for public schools
- ✓ Focus on practical solutions that drive student success

ARIZONA'S EDUCATION SYSTEM:

The Big Picture

An interconnected journey: PreK, K-12, Post-secondary

- Pre-K/Quality Early Learning: Education for children ages 3-4 that builds early skills for school success (public and private programs)
- K-12: Kindergarten through 12th grade: Arizona's public, charter, private, and home schools
- Post-secondary: Education after high school, including university, community college, trade, and workforce training programs







What Makes Arizona's Education Unique and Complex

- Robust school choice
- English-only instruction policies
- Innovation & alternative models (e.g., multiple ways to become a teacher, micro schools, etc.)
- Decentralized governance and decision-making



Pre-K / Early Learning Enrollment

~171,000 3-4-year-olds in Arizona (2023 Census)

~54,000 (32%) enrolled in quality early learning programs

Quality Early Learning Programs: Head Start, Quality First 3–5 Star, Preschool Development Grant programs, nationally accredited sites

K-12 Schools

~2,460 schools

- 61% public district
- 22% public charter
- 17% private
- <1% Career Technical Education District (CTED)

~1.3M students enrolled

- 69% public district
- 21% public charter
- 5% private
- 5% homeschool

~67,000 teachers

- 74% public district
- 17% public charter
- 9% private

K-12 Schools Demographic Context

- Arizona's K-12 system serves a racially and culturally diverse student population
- Students of color have made up the majority of students for nearly two decades
- Nearly half of all public school students qualify as economically disadvantaged
- Equity gaps persist in outcomes, access, and opportunity



Post-Secondary / **Higher Education Enrollment**



~630,000 students enrolled

38% Public universities

47% Community colleges

15% Private universities, colleges, career colleges, and vocational schools



Among students enrolled full-time in Arizona post-secondary institutions,

60% are state residents and 40% are nonresidents




National Rankings: Quality of Education


Arizona is consistently ranked at or near the bottom nationally.

Arizona is consistently ranked at or near the bottom nationally.







3rd Grade Reading

Third Graders Passing State Reading Exam

Current Standing (2023): 39%



National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) Results for 4th Grade Reading

(Closest to State Level Reading measure)

At or above proficient 2024:

- 26% Arizona
- 31% National Average





Eighth Graders Passing State Math Exams

Current Standing (2024): 28%



8th Grade Math

At or above proficient 2024:

- 26% Arizona
- 28% National Average
